

Preliminary Data Snapshot

A look at the data from the LGBTQ Safe Spaces National Needs Assessment, conducted by the New York City Anti-Violence Project, collected from 12/13/22-01/18/23. This preliminary information shows that anti-LGBTQ hate violence is:

WIDESPREAD

Around 3 out of every 5
 LGBTQ+ organizations surveyed
 experienced hate incidents

ORGANIZED

 More than half of reported protests were organized by white nationalist hate groups

RELENTLESS

 Most organizations experienced multiple hate incidents. Over 90% of organizations fear more will come in the future



"WE NEED HELP"

After a year marred by anti-LGBTQ+ legislation, dangerous disinformation and hateful targeting of our spaces and community members, a new survey conducted by the New York City Anti-Violence Project illuminates a dark picture of the shocking prevalence and intensity of anti-LGBTQ+ hate incidents across the country.

The data collected via online survey between December 13, 2022 and January 18, 2023 shows that the LGBTQ-owned or serving businesses, organizations and spaces faced an onslaught of harmful, hateful and sometimes violent incidents in 2022. **Around 60% of respondents experienced at least one anti-LGBTQ+ hate incident, and the majority experienced more than one.**



WHAT ORGANIZATIONS FACE

AROUND 3 OUT OF 5 PARTICIPATING ORGANIZATIONS EXPERIENCED AT LEAST ONE ANTI-LGBTQ+ HATE INCIDENT.

- Most were serial incidents, meaning more than one incident of the same type
- While more experienced online violence than phone or in-person violence, **nearly half of the** respondents that experienced violence reported hate both online and in-person/via phone
- One in four received hate mail, or a suspicious or threatening package

MOST ORGANIZATIONS DID NOT REPORT INCIDENTS TO THE POLICE. WHILE SOME FELT INTERACTIONS WITH POLICE WERE HELPFUL, THEY RESULTED IN FEW INVESTIGATIONS.

- Many organizations opted not to report incidents to the police for various reasons
- Property damage incidents and harrassment outside the space were more likely to be investigated by police, while fewer than half of hate mail and harrassing phone calls were
- Respondents filed reports in 63% of vandalism cases, but **only around 40% of threats and harassment outside of the building**, and in the case of protests, investigations were too few to enumerate

90% OF ORGANIZATIONS REPORT FEAR OF FUTURE ANTI-LGBTQ+ INCIDENTS HAPPENING.

- The majority of responding **organizations fear either more online hate or more threats of violence** in their location in the future
- Around 40% are **concerned about physical violence** happening to one of their staff members inside their space, 60% fear harassment outside of their space


